
Discover Richmond's wild side this summer

GREY SQUIRREL

Sciurus carolinensis

The grey squirrel was introduced into the UK in the 1800s and can be found in woods, gardens and parks. Grey squirrels are renowned for their agility, adept climbing and cunning - they can crack open bird feeders and run along tight-rope washing lines to get at their nutty prize.

Conservation status: Least Concern

COMMA BUTTERFLY

Polygonia c-album

The comma has distinctively ragged wing edges, which help to camouflage it - at rest, it looks just like a dead leaf! It prefers woodland edges, but can be spotted feeding on fallen fruit in gardens.

RED DEER

Cervus elaphus

Red deer are a distinctive rusty red colour in summer turning to a brown winter coat. A male is called a stag, and a female is called a hind. Red deer live in many places, including Europe, parts of Asia, and the mountains near the Caucasus. Please stay at least 50 metres away from the deer to keep them happy and healthy.

One of our most iconic waterbirds, the mute swan is famed for its grace and beauty. It is also considered to be a romantic of the bird world because partners form a perfect love heart with their necks.

PIGEON Columbidae

Columbidae is the bird family that includes doves and pigeons. These birds have round bodies, small heads, short necks, and thin beaks. They mostly eat plants like seeds, fruit, and leaves.

BUMBLEBEE

Bombus

Bumblebees are large, furry, and charismatic insects are well-known for their meandering, 'bumbling' flight, and their distinctive loud buzz - which is where their scientific name Bombus (meaning 'booming') comes from. In Britain we have around 270 species of bee and of them, 24 are species of bumblebee.

Conservation status: Priority Species
